Syllabus for Hebrew Exegesis (OTL 601-603)

Front Range Bible Institute (Fall 2010)

I. Course Description

Hebrew Exegesis is designed to build upon the basic learning that students obtain in first-year Hebrew. In this one-year course, students learn the process of obtaining the interpretation of the biblical text through a study of the original language.

This course helps students to build a workable level of Hebrew vocabulary and gain a reasonable mastery of important grammatical features and syntactical structures of the language.

This course will also teach the student to learn an effective method for doing ground-up studies in the original text.

II. Course Objectives

- A. To extend the students' breadth of Hebrew vocabulary
- B. To give students an understanding of the complete Hebrew verb system (the 'binyanim')
- C. To facilitate the acquisition of Hebrew grammar and syntax
- D. To impart knowledge of the history and development of the Hebrew language
- E. To equip students with the skills needed to discover the background for key vocabulary words
- F. To give students practice in their ability to translate from the Hebrew Scriptures
- G. To enable students to develop and polish a sound exegetical methodology
