NTE 620 Exposition of the Pastoral Epistles Fall 2024 Syllabus Professor Stanley Lightfoot III

I. Course Description

Exposition of the Pastoral Epistles (NTE 620) is an expositional analysis of 1 and 2 Timothy and Titus, with emphasis on the practical application of the instruction of these epistles for contemporary Christian living and pastoral responsibilities.

This course will consist of classroom lectures (based on the professor's notes), outside reading including thorough reading of the Pastoral Epistles themselves, a research paper and the preparation, delivery and evaluation of a sermon from one of the Epistles. Notes will be provided, but the student is expected to add to those notes as the course progresses based on the lectures and classroom discussion.

II. Course Objectives

- A. To provide the student with a foundational understanding of the Pastoral Epistles.
- B. To help the student develop an enhanced ability to proclaim the Word of God and apply that faithful proclamation to the lives of the listeners.
- C. To provide the student with an understanding of the issues that face a local church pastor on the basis of Paul's instruction to Timothy and Titus.
- D. To help students see the value of pastoral ministry and how God uses pastors to impact His people in the local church. To challenge the student to serve the Lord Jesus, whether in pastoral ministry or some other avenue of life service.
- E. To help each student grow in his/her walk with Christ.

III. Required Course Materials

IV. Course Requirements

- A. Attend all classes.
 - o If a student must miss a class, watch the lecture on the FRBI ecampus website.
 - o Class participation is also required.

- B. Read the Pastoral Epistles (1 and 2 Timothy, Titus) through five (5) times in five (5) different English translations.
 - Please select translations (ie. KJV, ESV, NASB, etc.) not paraphrases (ie. The Living Bible, The Message, J.B. Phillips, etc.).
 - o Note this reading on the attached form and submit by November 12.
- C. Keep a journal related to your reading in the Epistles.
 - o Make note of major themes, major doctrinal emphases and major pastoral emphases.
 - Take special note of exegetical insights and questions/observations that may arise in the course of your reading.
 - o Reference these as the class discusses the pertinent passages.
- D. Read Kent "The Pastoral Epistles" plus Lightfoot "A Theological Framework for Pastoral Ministry" (Certificate level), Kent & Lightfoot plus 200 pages (B.B.S.) or Kent and Lightfoot plus 400 pages (M.B.S and M. Div.).
 - o For the additional required pages, the B.B.S. and Masters level students may read from books in the course bibliography, or from other sources of the student's choice as long as they are approved by the instructor.
 - o Keep track of your reading on the attached form and submit by November 12.
- E. Write a research paper on one of these topics:
 - o the Role of the Pastor in the Pastoral Epistles
 - o the Role of Women in the Church (1 Timothy 2:8-15)
 - o the Qualifications of a Bishop/Pastor (1 Timothy 3:1-7; Titus 1:5-9)
 - o the Nature and Purpose of Inspiration (2 Timothy 3:16-17)
 - o Living in Light of His Coming (Titus 2:11-15)
 - The paper should be 5-10 pages in length (Certificate level), 10-15 pages (B.B.S.) or 15-20 pages (M.B.S. or M. Div.), double spaced, with a bibliography of works consulted.
 - Select a topic and inform the professor by September 24.
 - Completed paper due October 22.
- F. Complete the course project by preparing an expository sermon or bible study according to the general guidelines in this syllabus.
 - Teach / preach the sermon or bible study in a public setting, have the sermon or bible study evaluated by a pastor, professor or church leader and turn in the sermon or bible study evaluation.
 - o Due November 12.

VIII. Student Project

- A. Each student will be required to prepare and deliver a sermon or bible study on a passage of his choosing from the Pastoral Epistles.
- B. Each student must select the text from which he plans to teach / preach by October 1. No two students may teach / preach from the same text.
- C. Students will read the chosen text a minimum of 20 times from an English translation, making exegetical and application observations as they read.
- D. Students will consult at least five (5) exegetical resources and make notes regarding syntactical structure, word studies, contextual considerations, etc.
- E. Students will create an original outline (no copies of other's work) based on their preparatory work. The outline should include a title, the text, the Big Idea (the main focus of the passage) and a detailed outline of the passage to be taught / preached, with an attention-arresting introduction, main points, sub-points (where appropriate) and a conclusion that draws the message to a climactic close. Give particular attention to appropriate application. Submit the outline by October 15.
- F. Students will teach / preach the sermon or bible study in a public setting in front of a pastor, professor or church leader, have that pastor, professor or church leader evaluate it, and submit the evaluation by November 12.
